The Opterus Helen Rose STEM Award was given to Robin Doucet. "Being chosen as the winner of this scholarship I still don't fully believe it. It feels as though a weight has been lifted from my shoulders and I will truly be able to focus on my studies and my son," said Robin. "I will forever be grateful for the wonderful gift." Robin will be attending Dalhousie University in Nova Scotia, Canada to pursue a Bachelor of Science (Nursing). She is a young mother and welcomes the challenge of becoming a nurse. In her words, "Being a nurse is so much more than giving medications and checking vitals. It is learning about the patient and being accepting of their qualities, it is forming a bond and having them be comfortable with you to give the best care as possible."

The Opterus Valerie Ann Arts Award was given to Reem (Karimeh) Mahmood. "I am really crying at the moment," said Reem. "Sometimes it's not only about our hard-work, sleepless nights, and doing our best. I have been working on myself to become a pioneer feminist activist in my country since 2016, and I became one. Now, I got over the financial obstacle, and despite the fact that I am a lower-middle-class young woman, I will be able to study my dream program (Gender and women's studies) at my dream University." Reem will be attending York University in Toronto, Canada to study Gender and Women's studies. As a feminist activist, this program will give her new tools and academic perspective to understand and analyze women situation in Syria where she currently lives. "This scholarship will transform my life, to move from a war survivor, scared feminist activist to an empowered woman who will use her privileges to help other women and enhance the feminist scene in her region."

About Dr. McKilligin

Helen led a groundbreaking life. She graduated from the University of Aberdeen in 1958 with a specialty in pediatrics. She was a published author, writing a book with pioneering insights into the principles of neonatal nursing in 1970. She practiced in Newfoundland at the Grace Hospital and taught as an associate professor at the medical school at Memorial University in Newfoundland. She helped form the first Family Planning Association of Newfoundland that opened a birth control centre in St. John's, which was the first of its kind in the province. In 1980 she moved the family to Ontario and worked for the ministry of health creating



groundbreaking programs in reproductive health. Before retiring she also completed her fine arts degree at the OCAD University. The Helen Rose STEM Award is dedicated to her memory.

Valerie lived with ovarian cancer for 5 years but passed away in February 2019. She was in New York during 9/11 doing what she loved as a member of the cast of Rag Time on Broadway. I believe her cancer made her one more victim of that day. She was an incredible actor and a brilliant director. She was a part of so many productions, Les Miserables - the North American tour, Romeo and Juliet in Stratford, Anne of Green Gables in PEI and one of my favorites, Star Mites, an off-Broadway production in NYC, just to name a few. She graduated from Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario and received the Lorne Greene Award for outstanding achievement in the practical and performing aspects of theatre while at Queen's. She also loved to rock and roll and sang in a local band in Stratford, Ontario. The Valerie Ann Arts Award is dedicated to her memory.
